— ABOUT —

Welcome to Social's spirit guide! This is not only a list of every spirit, liqueur, and fortified wine that we carry, it's also a way to learn about new spirits you may not have tried before. Each item comes with an interesting anecdote about it as well as tasting notes. Within large categories, spirits are broken out into flavor sub-categories to make it easy to find something new you'll love, based on what you already know you like. We hope you have as much fun perusing this guide as we had putting it together. Cheers!

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— A NOTE ON POUR SIZE/PRICING —

We strive to bring our guests the best deal possible when it comes to the way we charge for spirits and we want to be completely transparent about our pricing policies. Please ask your server/bartender if you have any questions or concerns about how much something is going to cost.

First, some terminology; Social abides by the following standard American pours:

- A standard American "shot" is 1.5 fluid ounces.
- A standard American "up" or "double" pour is 3 fluid ounces.

Most of the spirits and liqueurs in this menu have a price based on the "shot" price (a 1.5 oz pour). Fortified wines and a few lower-proof liqueurs are priced as 3 fluid ounce pours. These exceptions are clearly indicated in the spirit guide.

A spirit ordered "neat" or "on-the-rocks" will be served as a 1.5 fluid ounce pour, in glassware appropriate to the order. Therefore, unless otherwise specified by the guest, whiskey ordered neat will be served in a Glencairn glass, tequila ordered neat will be served in a tequila tasting glass, etc. A spirit ordered on-the-rocks will be served in a double Old Fashioned glass, with high-quality ice.

A "double" pour is a 3 fluid ounce pour priced at twice the price of the single (1.5 fluid ounce) pour, less a \$2 double discount.

— A NOTE ON PRODUCT ALLOCATIONS/AVAILABILITY —

Social has over 750 different spirits and liqueurs in-house, ranging in price from \$20 per bottle to over \$5,000 per bottle. For higher-end and allocated spirits, our goal is to price items fairly, so these rare and precisely-made spirits are not out of reach for the average person. In some cases we do this by limiting the number of pours a single person can order. We reserve the right to limit our rare and allocated spirits to one pour, per person, per night.

Keeping over 750 spirits and liqueurs available to our guests is a Sisyphean task, which we happily take on. We try our best to keep everything in stock. However, sometimes one of the many distributors we work with is out of a product for an extended period of time. Sometimes we are phasing out a product to replace it with a new one. Certain items can only be purchased once a year. And occasionally we just mess up. We apologize if your selected item is unavailable.

COLORADO WHISKEY

Although the craft distillation movement has taken off nationwide and excellent distilleries can be found in multiple states beyond the classic whiskey-producing states of Kentucky, Tennessee, and Pennsylvania, in the past five years or so Colorado has established itself as one of the definitive leaders in quality whiskey production nationwide. With an ideal climate for barrel aging and ready access to a plethora of small farmers growing a wide variety of organic and heirloom grains, the whiskey coming out of Colorado is both excellent and unique. Most of the distilleries on this page have been around long enough to release age statement-carrying whiskeys with 10-12 year ages and many distilleries are growing the grains they are using, or they have contracted with local farmers within a rock's throw of the distillery, a practice unusual outside of the state.

In short, much of the whiskey coming out of Colorado is as good or better than the whiskey from those states traditionally known for their whiskey industries. We have gathered the very best of the state on this list so order with confidence, you won't be let down.

— BOURBON —

BRECKENRIDGE HIGH PROOF 9

56% corn, 38% rye, 6% barley. A CO staple. The higher proof amplifies the flavors their flagship release is known for—toffee, caramel apple, cinnamon, stewed fruit, underripe banana, vanilla.

LEOPOLD BROS. 8 YEAR CASK STRENGTH 11

65% corn, 20% barley, 15% rye. LB employs a rare grain-to-bottle production and one of five private malting floors in the world. Toffee, citrus, Cracker Jacks, baking spices, nuts.

• Denver, unsourced, 54.2% ABV

DEERHAMMER FOUR-GRAIN STRAIGHT 10

70% corn, 16% oat, 9% rye, 5% barley. An unusual mashbill composed of 100% Colorado-grown grains imparts unique flavors of plum, coffee, tobacco, hickory, pecan pie, grilled peaches, oatmeal.

• Buena Vista, unsourced, 50% ABV

BRANCH & BARREL SB CASK STRENGTH 11

80% corn, 20% barley. B&B has grown from humble beginnings in a garage to one of Colorado's best distilleries. This 6-year single barrel is bold and superb. Toffee, buttercream, cherry cola, coca.

• Centennial, unsourced, 53% ABV

BOULDER SPIRITS BIB 10

51% corn, 44% barley, 5% rye. The non-traditional high-malt mashbill offers an interesting fruit profile. Lots of mango, papaya, chestnut, caramel, toasted marshmallow. Rich and well developed.

• Boulder, unsourced, 50% ABV

A.D. LAWS FOUR GRAIN STRAIGHT BIB 13

60% corn, 20% wheat, 10% rye, 10% heirloom barley. All grain sourced from Colorado farms. Dry and leathery with clove, breakfast tea, black pepper, dates, butterscotch. Long, peppery finish.

• Denver, unsourced, 50% ABV

— RYE —

TELLURIDE MOUNTAIN MASH 8

95% rye, 5% barley. At an average age of 3 years, this whiskey is younger than most on our wall but is still an excellent example of Colorado distilling. Finished in wine casks. Dry, spicy, well rounded.

• Telluride, unsourced, 46% ABV

A.D. LAWS SAN LUIS VALLEY BIB 13

96% rye, 4% barley. Aged over 6 years and named after the Colorado valley where they source their rye. Tobacco, wild mint, fennel, orange tea, sea salt, brown sugar, oak. A long, spicy finish.

• Denver, unsourced, 50% ABV

WOODY CREEK 9

100% Colorado heirloom Elbon rye. An incredible dram from the most-awarded Colorado distillery. Rye spice, fruit juice, Meyer lemon peel, raisin, apple, clover, pine, black pepper. Good value for proof.

OLD ELK STRAIGHT 14

95% rye, 5% barley. This exceptional dram won Best American Rye Whiskey at the 2020 International Whiskey Competition. Notes of peach cobbler, cinnamon, allspice, rye spice, caramel.

• Fort Collins, sourced, MGP, 50% ABV

LOCKE & CO ASPEN AGED 10

95% rye, 5% barley. Completely unique from anything else we carry, this rye is aged in oak but has aspen disks added during aging that impart flavors of pie crust, toffee, cinnamon, pine, mint.

LEOPOLD BROS. THREE-CHAMBER BIB 18

80% rye, 20% barley. Made with heirloom Abruzzi rye on a historic three-chamber still which is completely different from anything else in use today. Soft, floral, unique, excellent.

— SINGLE MALT —

STRANAHAN'S ORIGINAL SINGLE MALT 9

Colorado's oldest distillery has been producing single malt (100% malted barley) whiskey since 2004. Aged a minimum of four years. Some scotch notes, vanilla, cinnamon, caramel, chocolate, leather.

ROOT SHOOT SINGLE MALT BIB 9

With all grain sourced from within 30 miles of the distillery, this is one of the most hyper-local whiskeys we carry. And it's superb. Cobbler, honey, granola, cocoa, alpine florals. Bright, spicy finish.

SPIRIT HOUND STRAIGHT SINGLE MALT 10

100% malted Colorado barley. An exceptional dram. Aggressive and punchy but drinks smooth. Flavors of agave, butter, honey, butterscotch, pear, cinnamon, black tea, smoke.

— OTHER STYLES OF WHISKEY —

TALNUA AMERICAN WHITE OAK CASK 12

50% malted and 50% unmalted barley. A Colorado distillery making whiskey in the Irish tradition with the twist of aging in virgin white oak casks. Notes of green tea, peach, apricot, caramel, waffle cone.

A.D. LAWS CENTENNIAL WHEAT BIB 13

Made from 100% single season's harvest of heirloom Centennial wheat. Mountain strawberries, orange marmalade, alpine meadow, wildflower honey, jasmine tea, sage, grass, spruce tips, oak, anise.

OLD ELK DOUBLE WHEAT 16

71.5% wheat, 25% corn, 3.5% barley. The dram for those who adore Buffalo Trace wheated whiskeys like Pappy and Weller at a fraction of the price. Maple, leather, baking spice, coffee cake, pie crust. Superb.

RYE

Although bourbon may be considered the quintessential American whiskey nowadays, the first style of whiskey to be distilled in the United States was rye. Through the 1930's, rye was the most-distilled whiskey in the US, which is why the majority of classic whiskey cocktails call for rye instead of bourbon. Rye whiskey tends to be drier, spicier, and more savory than the caramel-honey sweetness associated with bourbon. The ryes on this list are broken into low-rye and high-rye categories, with the low-rye options likely more approachable to bourbon drinkers and the high-rye options closer in profile to what scotch drinkers are accustomed to.

Rye whiskey made in the United States has very similar regulations to those required of bourbon (our bourbon list can be found on the next two pages). It must be made from a fermented grain mixture that is at least 51% rye, aged in new, charred, white oak casks, distilled to no more than 160 proof, entered into the barrel for aging at no more than 125 proof, and bottled at 80 proof or more. The grain mixture that makes up a given rye whiskey is called its mash bill. Legally, 51% of the mash bill must be rye, the remaining 49% can be made up of any grain or grain mixture; corn, wheat, and malted barley are the most common. The mash bill has a significant influence on a given rye's flavor profile, so we've noted it on those ryes which disclose it. Except for a couple of exceptions noted below, there is no minimum duration required for aging rye.

Like bourbon, there are some legally defined styles of rye that do have stricter requirements than those ryes which comply only with the general definition. Many of these definitions mimic those required of bourbon. Below you can find explanations for some terms and legal definitions commonly used within the industry.

Straight rye must be aged for a minimum of two years but if aged for less than 4 years, it must carry an age statement. Bottled-in-Bond (BIB) rye conforms to the Bottled-in-Bond Act of 1897. The Act stipulates that BIB rye must be aged for a minimum of 4 years, be the product of a single distillation season, and be bottled at exactly 100 proof (50% ABV).

Small Batch (SMB) rye doesn't have a legal definition and is a subjective label that varies from one distillery to the next. Single Barrel (SB) is small batch to the extreme, it's an unblended bottling of a single, exceptional barrel. Barrel proof legally denotes a whiskey bottled to within 1% of a batch's ABV when the barrels were dumped after being fully aged.

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BOURBON

Although there are other spirits that are uniquely American (applejack and moonshine, for example) bourbon is recognized as the quintessential American spirit. And even though the lion's share of bourbon is produced in Kentucky, distillers in any US state can legally produce bourbon and label it as such as long as it is: made from a grain mixture that is at least 51% corn, aged in new, charred, white oak, distilled to no more than 160 proof, entered into the barrel for aging at no more than 125 proof, and bottled at 80 proof or more. Except for a couple exceptions noted on the next page, there is no minimum duration required for aging bourbon.

The grain mixture that makes up a given bourbon is called its mash bill. Although 51% of the mash must be corn, the remaining 49% can be made up of any grain or grain mixture; rye, wheat, and malted barley are the most common. Mash bills have a significant influence on a given bourbon's flavor profile so we've noted it on those bourbons which disclose it. Other factors that affect the final flavor include: bottling proof, level of char and time spent in a barrel, the climate where the distillery is located, and the skill of the distiller and the master blender. Flavors range from smooth and sweet, to floral and fruity, to malty and unique, to bold and spicy.

— SMOOTH & SWEET —

These bourbons are classic examples of the form. Though still complex, they have profiles dominated by the sweeter characteristics bourbon is known for like caramel, toffee, and vanilla.

JIM BEAM 76% corn, 12% rye, 10% barley. Not the worst budget bourbon out there, not the best. Classic, sweet bourbon profile. Gateway to the Beam small batch series (Basil, Knob, Baker's, Booker's). • Kentucky, unsourced, 40% ABV	8	LEGENT Collaboration between Jim Beam master distiller Fred Noe and Suntory master blender Shinji Fukuyo. 5-year bourbon finished in ex-sherry. Dark fruit, dried blueberries, strawberry, caramel, spice, leather. The entry level option for the Weller line. A good value for the price. Floral honey, vanilla, oak, peach, apple, peppercorn. Nice viscosity and a medium-long finish. • Kentucky, unsourced, 45% ABV	14	BLANTON'S SINGLE BARREL Buffalo Trace #2 mash bill (high rye). BOURBON

As mentioned on the previous page, although bourbon must spend some time in new, charred, white oak containers, there is no legally defined minimum age period for bottles simply labeled as "bourbon". That said, there are some legally defined styles of bourbon that do have stricter requirements than those bourbons which comply only with the general definition. Below you can find explanations for some terms and legal definitions commonly used within the industry.

Straight bourbon must be made in a single state and aged for a minimum of two years. In compliance with the general regulations for bourbon, any bourbon that is labeled as straight that has been aged under four years must carry an age statement.

Bottled in Bond (BIB) bourbon conforms to the Bottled-in-Bond Act of 1897. The Act stipulates that BIB bourbon must be aged for a minimum of 4 years in a federally bonded warehouse, be the product of a single distillation season and a single distiller, and be bottled at exactly 100 proof (50% ABV).

Small Batch (SMB) bourbon doesn't have a legal definition and is a subjective label that varies from one distillery to the next. For some larger distilleries, a "small batch" may be one of several hundred barrels, for craft distillers, small batch may denote a distillation run that will only fill four barrels. The term is somewhat meaningless, except within the context of the distillery's normal output.

Single Barrel (SB) is small batch to the extreme, it is an unblended bottling of a single, exceptional barrel. Bottles labeled as single barrel within the same brand are a fun adventure for fans of the brand, as they will be different from one to the next.

Barrel proof legally indicates a whiskey bottled to within 1% of a batch's ABV when the barrels were dumped after being fully aged.

— BOLD & SPICY —

These whiskeys play up the rye spice and baking spices found in bourbon and their ABVs are often on the higher side.

AMERICAN & CANADIAN WHISK(E)Y

The category "American whiskey" includes bourbon and rye but is more typically used as a kind of catch-all for whiskeys that don't fall neatly into those two categories, such as Tennessee Whiskey, American single malt, uncategorized, unique whiskeys, corn whiskey, and white whiskey. Canadian whisky regulations are not nearly as strict as those in America and Europe. This has led to a (not necessarily undeserved) bias against Canadian whisky as a substandard product compared to whiskey produced elsewhere. However, this bias has more to do with what's available to American consumers than any intrinsic lack of quality in Canadian whisky. There are great Canadian whiskies, you just have to hunt for them. Here's an interesting aside (at least for lovers of all-things whiskey) about the spelling of the word "whisk(e)y". Whisky (pluralized whiskies) and whiskey (pluralized whiskeys) are both accepted spellings. A decent guideline for when to use each spelling is that whiskey coming from countries which have an "e" in their name tend to use the spelling that includes the "e". Therefore, distilleries in America and Ireland typically use "whiskey" while distilleries in Canada, Scotland, and Japan tend to prefer to use "whisky". Though there are exceptions, it's nonetheless a good rule of thumb.

— TENNESSEE WHISKEY —

Like bourbon, Tennessee Whiskey must be made from a grain mash bill containing at least 51% corn, and so could legally be grouped into the bourbon category. However, many Tennessee Whiskeys employ a separate process that make them unique from standard bourbon—the Lincoln County Process, in which the un-aged whiskey is filtered through charcoal before it is entered into the barrel in order to mellow and smooth it out.

— AMERICAN SINGLE MALT —

As of December 2024, the U.S. finally has a codified, legal standard for single malt whiskey: ASM is whiskey made in the US at a single distillery, with a 100% malted barley, as other whiskies, like Scotch, require), aged in oak casks, distilled to a maximum of 160 proof from either pot or column distillation, and bottled at 80 proof or higher. See the Colorado Whiskey page (page 2) for additional American single malt options. In contrast to the regulations surrounding the production of other American whiskeys such as bourbon and American rye, it does not appear that the use of new or "virgin" oak casks will be part of the American single malt definition. This is similar to single malt regulations in other countries, such as Scotland, where the use of ex-bourbon, ex-port, and ex-sherry casks is common. In addition, maximum barrel entry proof is undefined as well. Unlike bourbon and rye that can readily take on the compounds imparted by the virgin oak at a relatively low barrel entry proof of 120, used barrels require a higher ABV in order for the depleted compounds in the oak to affect the booze.

Corn whiskey and white whiskey are similar in that many aficionados consider them to be less refined styles when compared to other American whiskey offerings. And though they can exude a certain rustic charm, there is nothing inherently lower quality in a corn-heavy mashbill or a lack of barrel aging. White whiskey is simply unaged whiskey, regardless of style. It fosters an appreciation for the true nature of the grains and their terroir, as well as the distiller's talent. Corn whiskey production has rules similar to those governing bourbon and rye, with the exception that at least 80% of the mashbill is corn (compared to bourbon's 51% corn requirement) and corn whiskey can be aged in used barrels.

— IRISH WHISKEY —

Irish whiskey can be made throughout the island of Ireland, including both the Republic of Ireland and Northern Ireland. It must be distilled to no more than 94.8% ABV, matured in wooden casks for a minimum of three years, and bottled at no less than 40% ABV. It must include malted barley and may include other malted and unmalted cereal grains, resulting in four legally defined styles of whiskey. If an Irish whiskey carries an age statement, it must represent the youngest whiskey in the blend.

Malt whiskey is made using 100% malted barley and distilled in pot stills. Pot Still whiskey is made from a mash of a minimum 30% malted and a minimum 30% unmalted barley, with up to 5% of other cereals added, and is distilled in pot stills. Grain whiskey is made using no more than 30% malted barley in combination with other whole unmalted cereals—usually corn, wheat, or barley—and is distilled in column stills. Blended Irish whiskey is a mixture of any two or more of the styles of malt, pot still, and grain whiskey. The word "single" on a label (as in single malt, single grain, or single pot still) denotes a whiskey from a single distillery.

— JAPANESE WHISKY —

There is some confusion about the rules surrounding Japanese whisky production, even among informed imbibers and reputable industry publications. This is due to a dramatic shift in the legal landscape that occurred in 2021. Prior to the change in regulations, production standards were more loosely defined than in other major whisk(e)y-producing countries, and whisky labeled "Japanese" needed merely to be blended and bottled in Japan, not made in Japan. The use of imported raw and malted barley and other cereal grains was an accepted and common practice, as was the import of unaged and aged whisky; additives were essentially unregulated. This is not to say that the whisky being produced in Japan at the time was subpar. To the contrary, reputable distillers such as Nikka, Suntory, Chichibu, and Mars Shinshu were producing some of the best whisky in the world with production standards in line with those for scotch and bourbon. But they were doing so voluntarily (which is very Japanese, I must say) and their products were competing with brands from international importers that were buying subpar juice and labeling it as "Japanese". This diluted the value of those brands that were doing things correctly and undermined the regard for Japanese whisky worldwide.

After a three-year grace period to allow producers to adapt, the new production regulations went into effect in April 2024. Now, Japanese whisky must be produced from malted grain, other cereal grains, and water sourced from Japan. All production steps must take place within Japan. The product must be distilled to an ABV of less than 95%, aged for at least three years, and bottled at 40% or higher. Natural caramel color is allowed. The new rules level the playing field and ensure these products are of the highest quality.

In the last few years, imbibers worldwide have discovered how great Japanese whiskies can be. As demand skyrocketed, Japan's stocks of aged whisky were rapidly depleted. In response, brands like Suntory and Nikka have greatly reduced the amount of age-statement whiskies available. This is why affordable age-statement-carrying Japanese whiskies are so hard to find.

SINGLE MALT SCOTCH

For many people, single malt scotches are the ultimate expression of the form because they showcase the true nature of a distillery's product. As discussed on the previous page of blended scotches, the word "single" in single malt does not indicate that the scotch is from a single barrel or single batch (in fact nearly all single malts are the product of blending different barrels of different ages to achieve a consistent product) but instead, that the scotch is from a single distillery. The "malt" part of single malt is barley. In fact, all single malt scotches are distilled from a fermented mash of 100% malted barley.

Malting is the process of adding water to grain to germinate it, then heating the grain to stop germination. This process converts the starches in the grain into simple sugars that are more readily fermentable by yeast. In the case of scotch production, germination is often halted by heating the grain over a fire of peat. Peat is partially decomposed plant matter that forms in wet, cold regions. Not all scotches are peated, but for those that are, this is what gives them their characteristic smoky, iodine-like flavor.

A scotch's peat character, or "peatiness", is measured in PPPM (Phenol Parts Per Million). Phenols are the flavoring compounds imparted by the peat and PPPM levels can range from zero for unpeated scotches to 150 or more for heavily peated versions. But peat is just one characteristic flavor found in single malt scotch. Other common flavors include honey, floral notes, and fruit notes. This page contains our lighter, more floral and fruity scotches. The next page lists our scotches with more peat character.

— FRESH FRUIT & FLORAL —

SINGLE MALT SCOTCH

Many scotch whiskey references will attempt to group single malts by the region of Scotland in which they were produced. And while region is still a legitimate way of grouping single malts for historical purposes, in recent years, scotch distilleries have become less rigidly defined by a single flagship product, with many producing excellent peated and unpeated single malts irrespective of traditional regional flavor profiles. For instance, Islay (pronounced EYE-luh), traditionally known for creating some of the most heavily peated scotches, has also got a fair number of non-peated options; Bunnahabhain, Bruichladdich, and an annual release of non-peated Caol Ila, to name just a few. And the Highlands region has products ranging from the salty smokiness of Talisker to the delicate floral notes of Glenmorangie. There's really no point in grouping these into a flavor "region" as vast and diverse as the Highlands. So, while Scotland's whiskey-producing regions aren't a perfect guide to how a specific single malt may taste today, it's still interesting to examine them for their historical profiles.

The Speyside whisky region is truly abundant in rivers, glens, history, and whisky. Speyside hosts about 60 percent of the country's distilleries. Although each distillery's products are unique, the region is best known for well-rounded, lighter, accessible, lower-peat scotches. The regional use of sherry casks is common.

The Highlands is the largest region by land mass and the diversity of options within it reflect its size. For purposes of flavor profile, it's often useful to break it down into sub-regions. The Northern Highlands is best known for sweet and full-bodied single malts. The Southeastern Highlands offerings tend lighter and delicate, and the Western highlands retain the peaty/briny influence from the coast.

The Lowlands is a large region with relatively few distilleries. The single malts from here are generally synonymous with lighter and grassier whisky, most of which eschews peat.

The Campbeltown region was once known as the "whiskey capital of the world" with more than 30 distilleries operating in this tiny region at it's height. Today only three remain, and they produce some of the most interesting single malts in the country that balance notes of dried fruit, vanilla, toffee, and brine within a dry and pungent body.

The Islands region, technically part of the Highlands, produces a wide range of flavorful malts that are usually characterized by a strong presence of peat and brine.

Islay is an island and region unto itself. It famously produces some of the most peat-forward scotches in the world. The drams from Islay are where many a scotch lover will settle after working their way through those of the other regions.

— BLENDED SCOTCH —

Although some of the most sought-after bottles of Scotch are single malts (which can be found on the previous two pages), there is nothing inherently better about single malts vs. blended Scotches. And, the vast majority of the Scotch sold in the world (about 94%) is of the blended variety. But what's the difference? In fact, there are five legal categories of Scotch: single malt, single grain, blended malt, blended grain, and blended Scotch. The similarities in naming and the awkward terminology used make Scotch categories confusing to nearly everyone. Let's sort it out.

The "single" in single malt (or single grain) refers to the fact that the juice in the bottle is from a single distillery in Scotland. The term blended means that the Scotch in your bottle is sourced from multiple distilleries. Malt whiskey is derived from 100% malted barley, while grain whiskey uses other cereal grains like corn, rye, and wheat, in addition to malted barley, similar to US bourbon production. The beauty of these blends is that you can often find great ones (especially within the blended malt category) that are every bit as good as a single malt for half the price. We've tried hundreds of blends over the years and these are some of our favorites.

DEWAR'S WHITE LABEL BLENDED 8
The number one selling scotch in The United States. Not our favorite. Decent for mixing. Harsh alcohol that's also somehow watery. Hops, honey, peat, lemon peel, tangerine. Uninteresting.

VODKA

In the US, vodka is legally defined as an alcoholic beverage of no less than 40% ABV (80 proof) that is distilled—or treated after distillation with charcoal or other filter materials—as to be without distinctive character, aroma, taste, or color. Bah-lo-ney. As any vodka drinker who favors a specific brand will tell you, any given vodka's "neutral" character, is in the taste buds of the imbiber. In fact vodkas have a wide range of flavors from light and truly neutral, to oily and unctuous. Different vodkas can have characters that range from an earthy minerality to a citrusy sweetness. The texture, or mouthfeel, of vodka can vary greatly as well.

Vodka can be made with any base material that contains fermentable sugars. Wheat and potatoes are traditional favorites but vodka can—and is—made from everything from sugarcane to cow's milk. Here we break down our vodka selection by base fermentation material.

In the US, gin is legally defined as an alcoholic beverage of no less than 40% ABV (80 proof) that possesses the characteristic flavor of juniper berries. Besides the required presence of juniper, pretty much any other botanicals can be added to the distillate, which makes gin one of the most varied spirit families. Flavors can range from extremely juniper- and pine-forward styles to more herba-ceous, floral, and citrusy styles. Modern gin reviewers break unaged gin into several categories, of which classic and contemporary are the most prevalent. Classic gins are those in which juniper dominates the profile (most London dry gins fall into this category). Gins with a specific legal definition fall into the classic category as well. Contemporary gins are those in which the flavor of juniper is heavily tempered by the presence of other botanicals. Contemporary gins are found on the next page.

— LONDON DRY —

The legal definition "London Dry" is not a geographical designation—London Gin can technically be made in any country. Nor is it really a definition of flavor profile. Instead, London Dry is a strict production standard that the gin must adhere to. London Gin must be made from neutral spirit of agricultural origin which is redistilled in the presence of all flavoring components which must be natural plant materials. The gin must come out of the still at no less than 70% ABV and be bottled at no less than 40%.

— DRY GIN WITH A TWIST —

We used to carry more gins with a classic, juniper-dominant profile, but the reality of that singular style is that once you've had one, you've kind of had them all. Nothing against those of you who like drinking pine-needle tee, but the traditional gin profile of juniper and not much else is so one-note that there is no need to carry six different options. The gins in this next category bridge the gap between the classic London Dry flavor profile and the contemporary style gins found on the next page. While juniper still dominates the aroma and palate, these offerings have a more nuanced botanical profile than most classic dry gins.

— LEGALLY-DEFINED STYLES —

These gins are unique enough to have a legal definition separate from other gins, called a Protected Geographical Indication (PGI) (or at least they once did). While Mahón still retains its PGI, Plymouth voluntarily gave up its PGI in 2015. Most gin references still list Plymouth as its own, legally defined style so we've broken it out here as well.

CONTEMPORARY GIN

Contemporary gins are those gins which—starting haltingly with a few early examples in the late 90s and gradually becoming a cascade of new gins in the last ten years—redefined the centuries-old characterization of what gin should taste like, namely, like juniper and pretty much nothing else. These gins still have the juniper flavor present but they push the boundaries of what gin can be by letting other botanicals take center stage. This is a stylistic category, not a legal one, and styles can be predominantly citrusy, floral, spice-forward, and botanical or herbaceous.

— CITRUSY & FRUIT-FORWARD GINS —

These gins amplify the citrus notes present in most gins. They work great in gin sours like a Tom Collins, Gimlet, or Last Word.

Herbal gins—also called alpine gins or botanical gins—probably make up the largest subsection of this category. Piggybacking off the herbaceous notes provided by juniper, they take things a step further with verdant botanicals like herbs, grasses, barks, roots, tea, etc. These gins are often trying to embody the local terroir, a sense of place with a more specific story than that of other gins. When we talk about “spiciness” with gins, we’re typically not talking about the type of spice one associates with hot peppers. Instead, we are referring to actual spices that may dominate the profile, things like coriander, curry, cinnamon, anise, and cardamom.

GENEVER, OLD TOM GIN, BARREL AGED GIN, & AQUAVIT

For the majority of people, the idea of what "gin" is brings up thoughts of a spirit that is clear, extremely dry, and flavored like pine tree extract. They are thinking of the London Dry style of gin, and people either love it or hate it. Though this style dominates popular culture and global sales, it is not the first or last word on what gin can be. The world of spirits distilled with juniper is an expansive one; here are a few styles worth trying, even if you don't love London Dry. Our aquavit selection is found here as well.

— GENEVER —

Genever (or Jenever or Holland's Gin) is the juniper-flavored national and traditional liquor of the Netherlands and Belgium, from which gin evolved. Unlike gin, which is made from a neutral spirit base, genever uses a malted grain base, and therefore resembles whiskey more than gin in its production—with the notable exception of a strong dose of juniper.

There are three kinds of genever, jonge (young), oude (old), and corenwijn (corn wine). The terms have nothing to do with the age of the spirit or the grain used, but rather the level of malt wine contained in the final product. Malt wine is the name the genever industry gives to distilled spirit made from malted grain. Jonge contains up to 15% malt wine, with the remaining volume made up of neutral alcohol. This is the closest relative of modern London Dry gin. Oude genever contains between 15% to 50% malt wine. This is the more classic version of the spirit. Corenwijn is the richest and maltiest of the three, with between 50% and 100% malt wine.

— OLD TOM GIN —

Old Tom Gin is something like the gastronomical “bridge” between Genever and modern gin. Like genever it can be (but doesn't have to be) barrel aged. And it can be (but doesn't have to be) sweetened post distillation, which gives it a similar character to the malty-sweet flavor of genever in some respects. They are usually sweetened with sugar, but other agents, like honey, are commonly used as well. Old Tom Gin was the most popular style of gin in 18th century England, the addition of sugar was originally aimed at covering up flaws in the gin due to sub-par distillation techniques but modern Old Tom gins are of the same quality as their drier cousins.

— BARREL AGED GIN —

There is quite a bit of confusion regarding the difference between barrel-aged gin and Old Tom gin. Although many Old Tom gins are barrel aged, they also usually have added sugar. The gins in this category have no sugar added after distillation. The time in oak lends a subtle softness and nuttiness not found in unaged gins.

— AQUAVIT & BOTANICAL SPIRITS —

Sometimes called the "gin" of Scandinavia, this traditional spirit is made primarily from the botanicals dill, caraway, and fennel. The word "aquavit" is derived from the Latin aqua vitae, meaning “water of life”, and its crisp, rejuvenating profile is well worth a try.

ABSINTHE

One of the most misunderstood spirits, true absinthe, with wormwood, has been legal in the United States since 2007. Although there is no official definition for what makes absinthe, absinthe, some historical norms do exist. Generally, absinthe is a high-proof distilled spirit that has three primary botanicals present in the distillation: green anise or aniseed, fennel, and grand wormwood. Besides these three, most absinthes typically have 12-20 other botanicals present as well, so flavors between brands can vary greatly.

During distillation, the grand wormwood releases a chemical called thujone. This natural chemical is also found (in much lower concentrations) in common plants such as rosemary, juniper, oregano, and sage. Though not a hallucinogenic like many believe, thujone is a different type of neurotoxin than ethanol, so absinthe can give you a different buzz than other types of alcohol. And it likely will give you a buzz, distillations range from 110 Proof (55% ABV) to 160 Proof (80% ABV), so a single shot of absinthe can have the equivalent alcoholic potency of two, 80 Proof shots of bourbon.

The dominant notes in nearly all absinthes will be anise (licorice), fennel (sweet, earthy), and wormwood (bitter, herbaceous) with the other botanicals present contributing to the flavor in subtle ways. We serve absinthe traditionally, with water and sugar.

Other spirits with a strong-anise-based character are listed here as well. Sweeter, anise-based liqueurs are listed on page 30.

— VERT (GREEN) ABSINTHE —

All absinthe is distilled at least twice. Verte absinthe has an added infusion step after the distillations. This steeping of botanicals without a subsequent distillation is what gives verte absinthe its characteristic yellowish-green hue.

— BLANCHE (WHITE) ABSINTHE —

Blanche absinthe is balanced and delicious. Blanche absinthe lacks the final infusion step of green absinthe, leaving it clear, colorless, and generally less herbaceous.

TEQUILA

Tequila may not be the answer, but it's worth a shot! This nectar of the Gods, this perfect expression of terroir, this beautiful, shining jewel comes to us courtesy of the humble blue agave plant. Once stripped of its spines, the piña—or heart—of the agave is roasted, crushed, fermented, and then distilled into the world's best spirit. Social only carries tequila made from 100% agave. On this page and the next, we break out our tequila selection by the time it spends in oak: silver, reposado, añejo, and extra añejo.

For the silver and reposado tequilas from Jalisco, we've indicated whether the juice is sourced from highland agaves or lowland agaves. Highland tequilas tend to be fruitier while those from the lowlands tend to be earthier and more vegetal. For tequilas aged longer than reposados, these subtle distinctions are typically covered up by the flavors imparted by the oak.

Just as a whiskey distillery can produce multiple brands under one roof, tequila distilleries often produce more than one brand as well. However, unlike whiskey distilleries where all the brands are owned in-house, tequila distilleries will often produce juice for multiple brands that have no common ownership. Tequila distilleries track their products with the Norma Oficial Mexicana number, or NOM. The NOM tells you what distillery produced your tequila. We have indicated each brand's NOM after the ABV.

Mexico's tequila regulator, the CRT, allows tequila producers to legally “mellow” tequila with limited amounts (up to 1% of volume) of specific ingredients, without disclosing them on labels. These ingredients can include caramel color, vanilla extract, oak extract (to mimic barrel aging) glycerin (to increase viscosity and mouthfeel), and sugar syrup. They are highly concentrated—three drops of each is enough for a mediocre blanco to mimic the profile of a dram that has spent 5 years in oak. As Americans, we are used to an enormous amount of transparency and quality when it comes to the spirits we consume. As a result, “additive-free” tequila has become the new ideal; “100% agave” is no longer sufficient for discerning tequila imbibers who prefer the naturally occurring flavors of roasted agave, citrus, pepper, and cinnamon, to the vanilla sugar and birthday cake flavors of additive-laden tequilas.

The past five years have seen a surge in consumer interest for “additive-free” tequilas, with independent verifiers and media projects attempting to document brands made without these mellowing agents. Everything was going great until several large tequila brands that rely heavily on additives to make their low-quality tequila taste better (Don Julio, Casamigos, Clase Azul, Espolòn, Jose Cuervo) started to see the movement affect their bottom line and pressured the CRT to take action. In late 2024, the CRT sent letters warning brands to stop using “additive-free” language on labels and marketing, even extending responsibility to claims made on third-party websites, in some cases halting exports for brands they deemed in violation. As a result, independent verifiers have removed the “additive-free” language from their websites to prevent retaliation by the CRT against the very brands they were trying to promote.

At Social, we have been interested in additive-free tequilas for some time, and we've gradually expanded our selection. Due to the corrupt actions of the Mexican CRT, there are no longer published records of additive-free brands, but we are confident nonetheless in our assertions below about which brands are additive-free (AF) and those that contain additives (CA).

— BLANCO —

Blanco (or silver) tequila is not aged in oak, and is the truest expression of the form. Flavors of roasted agave generally dominate the palate but the local terroir dramatically affects the flavor as well—contributing citric, herbaceous, and/or mineral notes.

AGED TEQUILA

Interestingly, the practice of aging tequila didn't really start until the 1970s, when tequila manufacturers started to mimic the success of whiskey distillers in the US who were experimenting with longer resting times in oak for their white dog spirit, and then releasing the rested juice with an age statement and at a premium price. Although many tequila connoisseurs prefer the vibrant roasted agave, vegetal, black pepper, and cinnamon notes imparted by younger tequilas, there is no denying that more time in barrels gives tequila a fascinating and delicious profile all its own.

— REPOSADO —

Reposado tequila conforms to all the standards required of blanco tequila but is also aged for a short time (between 2 months and 1 year) in oak barrels. These can be virgin oak, charred oak, and/or ex- bourbon, wine, or brandy barrels.

— AÑEJO & EXTRA AÑEJO —

Añejo tequilas are aged for more than one year but less than three years in oak casks. The longer period in contact with oak imparts many of the same flavors you would expect to find in whiskey production, including vanilla, caramel, and toffee, but the best añejo tequilas still maintain dramatic notes of terroir and freshly roasted agave.

Extra añejo tequilas are aged for more than three years, with some age statements even moving into the double digits. With this much time in contact with wood, much of the terroir and agave character is lost, but the spirit that results is no less incredible. These very old tequilas transform into something completely new, and completely delicious.

MEZCAL

Mezcal is both a broad category of spirits and a narrow, legally defined product. Broadly, mezcal is classified as any spirit distilled in Mexico from the heart (piña) of any species of agave. Therefore, all tequila is mezcal. But in addition to being an all-encompassing agave distillation category, it is also a legally defined sub-category of itself. To label a bottle "mezcal" the agave distillate must be from either Oaxaca or one of seven other Mexican states. It must be 100% agave, but unlike tequila, it can be produced from any agave, not just Blue Weber. Because of the range of agave plants used, mezcal is the truest expression of Mexican terroir the country makes.

— ESPADÍN —

Espadín is the most commonly used agave in mezcal production with about 74% of mezcal using it. It's dominance is based on three main factors: its relatively short time to maturity (generally 8-12 years), its high sugar content, and its ability to grow in a cultivated environment. Espadín tends to produce mezcal with less earthy/minerality character and more citrus/herbal notes than other agave.

VERÁS JOVEN 8
Made in Santiago Matatlán, the "World Capital Of Mezcal" using a river rock oven, it has a lighter, more tequila-like profile than most. Fruit-forward and buttery. Honey, pollen, cashews, melon.

— WILD AGAVE —

Wild agave refers to uncultivated plants that grow haphazardly, usually in rocky hillsides, as opposed to "cultivated" agave that is planted in rows on tilled soil. Many of the agave species represented in this section cannot be farmed because they take too long to reach maturity, sometimes as many as 35 years. These varieties are often smaller than Espadín and cannot be harvested in any sort of industrial process, but must instead be hunted after like the elusive truffle. For these reasons, mezcals derived from wild agave tend to be more expensive, but, for connoisseurs, vastly more interesting than Espadín, and an inimitable expression of terroir. These are rare spirits; as the Mezcaleros say, "*Para consumo sacro, todo exceso es profano.*" (For sacred consumption, all excess is profane.)

DERRUMBES SAN LUIS POTOSI 13
Made from low-yield, wild Salmiana agave. One of the most terroir-intense mezcals we carry. Not smoky. Green pepper, jalapeño, slate and a heavy dose of minerality, milk, queso fresco. Superb.

RHUM AGRICOLE, SILVER & SPICED RUM

Sugarcane distillations are often split into two categories, rum agricole, which is produced directly from fermented sugarcane juice, and rum, which is produced from the fermented byproduct of the sugar refining process (molasses). Because rum is made in so many countries worldwide, the rules regarding its production vary widely, as does the profile of the final product.

For every class of spirit, from vodka to brandy to whiskey, there is a rum that is comparable. From funky, earthy distillations to bright and citrusy flavors, to rich and caramelly, there is a rum for every palate. Because there aren't as many regulations for rum as other spirits, rum distillers can play around with the spirit all they want, which makes every bottle a unique adventure. Below you'll find our available selection of rum agricole, cachaça, silver rum, and spiced rum. Aged rums are on the following two pages.

— RHUM AGRICOLE —

Rhum agricole is distilled directly from fermented sugarcane juice—rather than fermented molasses—which imparts more funky, vegetal, and grassy characteristics than a typical rum. It can be made anywhere in the world but the majority originates in the French speaking islands of the Caribbean, especially Martinique, Haiti, and Guadelupe. It is highly terroir driven, and distillations from different islands have very different profiles. Substitute rum agricole for a unique twist on classic rum drinks.

AGED RUM

In the early days of our country's history, rum was one of the most commonly distilled spirits with nearly 200 different distilleries operating along the Atlantic seaboard. Following the revolutionary war, British--controlled molasses shipments declined and as a result, so did the prominence and quality of rum available in the US. This decline continued until it's absolute low point, the bathtub distillations of prohibition. After prohibition ended, the funky, rich flavors of aged rums weren't as popular and the spirit Americans knew as "rum" became a nearly tasteless, vodka--like beverage. Only in the past ten to fifteen years have we seen a real resurgence of bold rums, fueled by the availability of incredible imports and by consumers eager for more flavorful options.

Here we break down our aged rum selection by general flavor profile. The rums on this page are lightly aged and unfiltered and/or exhibit a classic caramelly, aged rum profile. Our spicier, funkier aged rum options are on the following page.

— LIGHT & BRIGHT —

These rums are lightly aged to showcase both the flavor of fresh cane and the subtle notes of vanilla, caramel, and brown sugar that develop with time in wood. Although they are all high quality rums and can certainly be enjoyed neat, subbing them in for silver rums in classic cocktails will add complexity to those drinks.

FLOR DE CAÑA 7 YR

An excellent aged rum for cola mixing. Punches way above it's 80 proof. Notes of oak and fruit dominate but balance well with charred oak, vanilla, dark caramel, and toffee. Medium finish.

AGED RUM

When it comes to regulations concerning its production, rum is like the Wild West, pretty much anything goes. Rules vary from country to country which makes most standards (especially labeling requirements) essentially meaningless and hard to enforce. Most countries do not require any proof of age statements, and if proof is required, the age statement is often misleading. For example, in most countries it is not required (as it is with whiskey production in the US, Canada, Japan, Scotland, and most other whiskey-producing nations) that the age statement reflect the youngest rum in the bottle, instead, a bottle of rum need only contain a small percentage of rum that meets the statement (even a few drops is often enough). In addition, many labels are intentionally misleading, with the number highlighted on the front not reflecting the age but instead showing the number of rums in the blend, or showing an anniversary date, or just being completely arbitrary.

Although these practices may seem deceptive to American's accustomed to accuracy in labeling, it's just part of rum-producing culture. Once you accept that, you can ignore the label and judge the rum for its inherent quality (or lack of it). The reality is that age statements are less useful as an appraisal of a rum's quality than they are in whiskey production. So, at Social, we tend to ignore the age of the rum and instead carefully curate our rum selection with well-known, reputable producers that make outstanding products with incredible flavor. On this page you will find our most interesting and flavorful aged rums.

— COMPLEX & SPICY —

We could have called this category simply, "Foursquare", but we have high hopes that other brands will eventually follow in Foursquare's steps to make this style of spicy, zesty, very complex rum. Often called the Pappy Van Winkle of rum, all of Foursquare's rums are exceptional and most are limited release, single offerings, never to be reproduced. As a result they are hard to find and highly sought after by rum enthusiasts. Each of these bottles is already extinct; once gone, they can never be experienced again.

FOURSQUARE MARK XI SAGACITY 18

The 11th release in the Exceptional Cask Selections series. A blend of two single blended rums. Zesty palate, rife with ripe banana, vanilla, grapefruit rind, stewed berries, ginger, and oak.

— BOLD & FUNKY —

Jamaican rum is considered by many rum drinkers to be the highest-quality rum in the world. The four distilleries on the island all operate within the strict standards established by the Jamaican government. Sugar and caramel coloring are usually not added to the final product, only wild yeast is used in the fermentation process, and only pot stills are used in the distillation. All these factors result in full bodied, extremely flavorful, dry, and "funky" rums. This characteristic funkiness is called "hogo" and is found in rums from many places, but nearly always in those from Jamaica. It is a taste not everyone loves but one that everyone should try.

PLANTATION XAYMACA SPECIAL DRY 9

A nod to the native Arawak name for the island, this is a subtle introduction to the Jamaican style. Finished in ex-cognac barrels. Pineapple, banana, spicy oak, lemon zest, minor hogo.

The distinction between "aged rum," "dark rum," and "black rum" are essentially meaningless as there are no standards or regulations for any of these terms within the industry. They are in a separate category here because many of our guests ask for them specifically.

"Navy Strength" and "Overproof" usually designates a rum that has an ABV of at least 57% (114 proof) which is the minimum alcohol content required to ignite gunpowder doused in alcohol. There are several overproof rums in the previous sections of this rum list because other factors besides the proof were more dominant in determining classification.

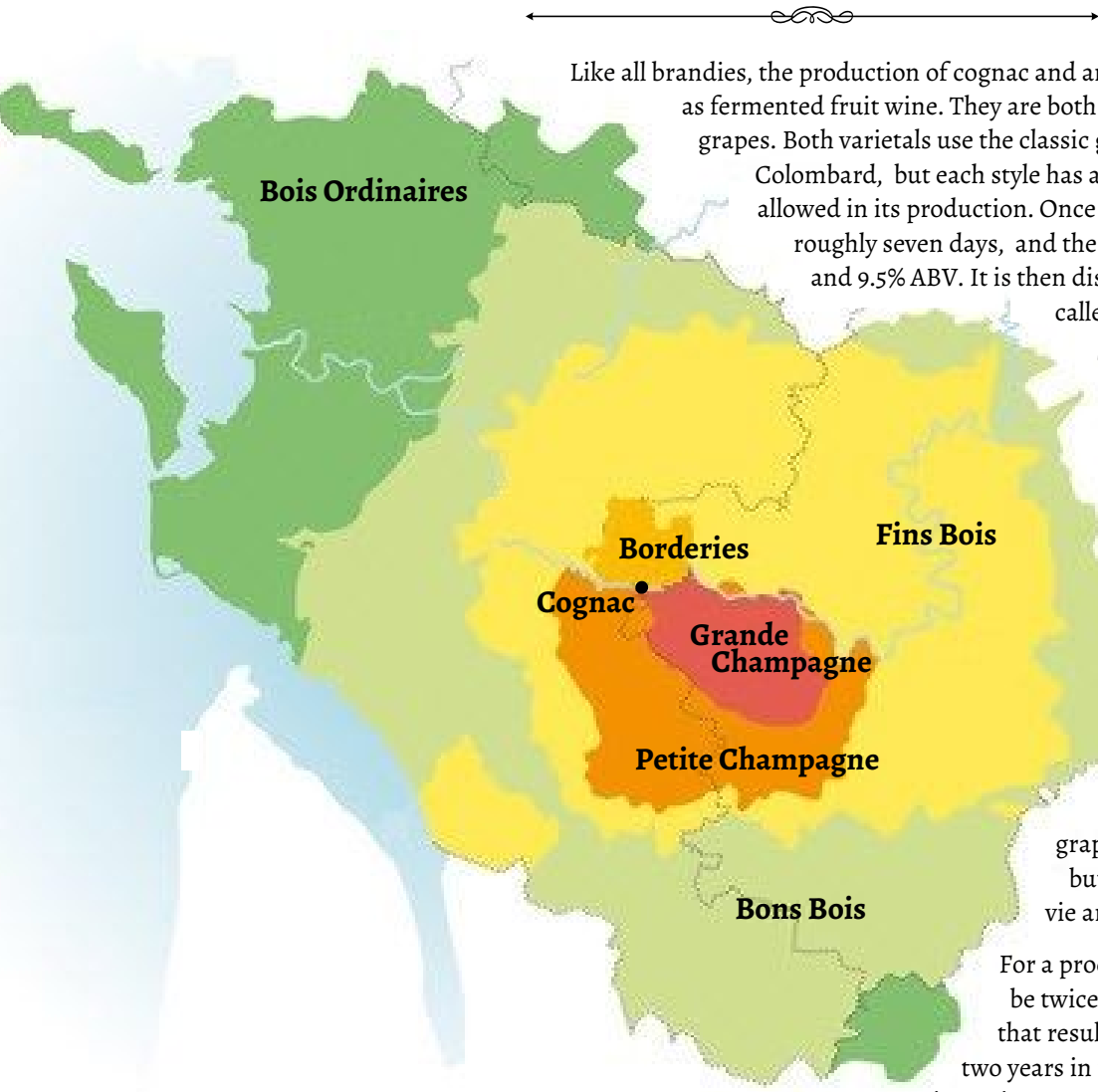

COGNAC



Like all brandies, the production of cognac and armagnac (found on the next page) starts as fermented fruit wine. They are both French brandies made from white wine grapes. Both varieties use the classic grapes of Ugni Blanc, Folle Blanche, and Colombard, but each style has additional, less common grape varieties allowed in its production. Once harvested, the grapes are fermented for roughly seven days, and the resulting wine is typically between 8.5% and 9.5% ABV. It is then distilled twice, producing a colorless spirit called eau-de-vie (French for "water of life").

The spirit must originate in the Cognac Appellation d'origine Contrôlée (AOC), a geographically-defined area north of Bordeaux in western France encircling the town of Cognac. The grapes used to make cognac must come from one of six designated growing areas, or 'crus' located in the region. The six crus of Cognac are: Borderies, Bois Ordinaires, Fins Bois, Bons Bois, Petite Champagne, Grande Champagne. Each of these areas has a specific terroir—soil and climatic conditions—which allow the grapes that grow there take on unique attributes. By extension, the resulting eaux-de-vie are completely unique to each cru as well.

For a producer to call its brandy "cognac", it must be twice-distilled in copper pot stills, the brandy that results (eau-de-vie) must be aged for at least two years in new, uncharred barrels made of French Limousin or Tronçais oak. Cognac is generally classified

by the time it spends in oak. VS (Very Special) designates eau-de-vie aged two years, VSOP (Very Special Old Pale) is aged four years, Napoleon is aged at least six years, and XO (eXtra Old) is aged at least ten years. Another designation, Hors D'Age is legally the same as XO but in practice usually indicates cognac aged for at least 20 years. Like bourbon and scotch, the age specifies the youngest juice in the bottle. Generally, the average age of a given bottle is much older than what the label indicates. Below is our selection of cognac.

ARMAGNAC, GRAPE BRANDY, PISCO, & GRAPPA

This page contains our list of armagnac (cognac is on the previous page), pisco, grappa, and otherwise uncategorized grape brandy. All of these styles of brandy start with a base of grape wine (or in the case of grappa, fermented grape must) which is then distilled; brandy made from the wine of fruit besides grapes, called eaux-de-vie and/or fruit brandy, is found on the next page.

— ARMAGNAC —

Like Cognac, the Armagnac region of France is subdivided into three geographically-defined terroirs: Bas, Ténarèze, and Haut. In addition to the grape varietals shared with its cousin, armagnac is commonly made from Baco 22A grapes. Unlike cognac, armagnac is distilled once in a column still, can be aged in French Gascon oak, and doesn't require any aging. It uses the same age classification system as cognac with the exception that VS indicates brandy aged at least one year, and VSOP indicates brandy aged at least six.

— GRAPE BRANDY & PISCO —

We carry only one aged grape brandy that doesn't fit neatly into the categories of cognac, armagnac, or pisco, so we're lumping it in here with a specialty brandy from South America called pisco. Pisco is brandy made in Peru or Chile by distillation of grape wine. The most common grapes used are Quebranta, Moscatel, and Torontel, with several other less common varietals allowed as well.

Peruvian pisco is distilled once in alembic copper pot stills. The use of wood aging is not allowed. In addition, Peruvian pisco must be bottled at distillation strength, dilution with water is not allowed. These regulations result in a rich, terroir-driven, full-flavored profile that is unique to each distiller. Chilean pisco, by contrast, has more variation in flavor profile because the regulations there allow distillers more flexibility in how the pisco is produced. Piscos from Chile can be produced in pot stills or column stills, can be diluted to proof, and can be aged in wood. This results in interesting piscos with quite a bit of flavor variation between producers.

EAUX-DE-VIE, FRUIT BRANDY, BERRY LIQUEURS, & ANISE LIQUEURS

Traditionally, the terms eau-de-vie (pluralized eaux-de-vie) and fruit brandy can be used interchangeably, however modern usage tends to reserve the term "fruit brandy" for those brandies which have been aged in wood (usually oak) and eau-de-vie as unaged fruit brandy. That is how we have broken them out here. This page contains a list of our fruit (non-grape) brandies and eaux-de-vie. This page also starts Social's list of liqueurs and amari. Up to this point in the Spirit Guide, everything has been a spirit, meaning that it is a distillation to which sugar has not been added. Starting with the list of berry liqueurs here, the offerings do contain added sugar. ABVs are typically lower than spiritous options. Liqueurs can be sipped neat, with ice, or used as a cocktail modifier.

— EAUX-DE-VIE —

Unaged brandy from fruit (or vegetables) other than grapes. Characterized by bright, assertive terroir of the ripe fruit represented.

A liqueur is an alcoholic beverage (spirit) that has been bottled with added sugar and typically has flavors derived from fruit, flowers, herbs, nuts, or other natural flavors. Liqueurs are distinct from eaz-de-vie, fruit brandy, and flavored spirits such as gin and aquavit, which contain no added sugar. This page contains our list of fruit liqueurs. Citrus fruits are those that contain high quantities of citric acid and other organic acids. Offsetting the high acidic levels of these fruits with sweetness often results in some of the most balanced liqueurs.

AMARI & HERBAL LIQUEURS

Amari (the pluralized form of the word, "amaro", Italian for "bitter") are herbal liqueurs, traditionally made by infusing grape brandy (or sometimes, neutral grain spirit) with a proprietary blend of botanicals including flowers, citrus juice and peels, herbs, aromatic plant roots and bark, and spices. Although the process varies from one amaro brand to another, this blend of macerated botanicals is usually redistilled then (often) aged and sweetened with sugar. There are hundreds of different amari with varying profiles and degrees of sweetness and bitterness; flavors are complex, aromatic, sometimes wild, often intense, but always interesting.

Many amari were originally distilled for their medicinal qualities and quite a few people still swear by the ability of certain amari to aid in digestion or cure a hangover. The Italians have known the benefits of an after-dinner amaro for centuries and Americans are now starting to understand the value of learning about the wide world of amari, either as an after-dinner sipper or a pre-meal aperitivo to whet the appetite, or as an ingredient to increase the complexity and nuance of their cocktails.
